Forum or Against 'Em: District C Candidates Face Off on May 1st

The City Council Candidate Forum for District C was held at Congregation Emanu El on May 1. The good news is that there are some excellent candidates running for the seat being vacated by Ellen Cohen, all with different backgrounds and talents. Excellent questions were posed to the candidates and their answers are worth hearing. The open seat for District C will be decided in the general election on November 5th. The District C seat is an important race. Mayoral and council candidates may now serve up to two 4-yr terms. Since most council candidates are reelected for a second term, whoever is elected will likely remain in office for the next 8 years.

Electing a responsive council person is essential to the health of our community. We rely on our district council member for a myriad of functions including getting missed trash collected, arranging meetings with contractors for public works projects, and voicing our concerns to the administration, Commissions and Council Committees.

Currently there are 10 candidates in the District C race. The following attended the Forum: Abbie Kamin, Nick Hellyar, Greg Meyers, Shelly Kennedy, Bob Nowak, Mary Jane Smith and Daphne Scarbrough. Three more joined the race after the event: Kendra Yarbrough Camaren, Kevin Walker and Amanda Wolfe.

Water Line Project Update

Restoration is underway for the 36" South Blvd Water Line Project. Completion was planned for mid-May, but the timeframe was extended to accommodate unexpected repairs of an adjacent 8" water line serving nearby homes. The contractor will finalize roadway repairs, followed by curb and sidewalk repairs. Replacement of sod and other plants will be the last step. The work is expected to ensure that the 36" line serving West University Place does not require repair for another 40 years.

Urban Wildlife/Rodent Population Explosion From Feeding Pets Outside

As is common each spring, BOCA is experiencing an explosion of its urban wildlife population. Rats and squirrels are abundant and can be seen in all parts of the neighborhood scurrying along fences and telecom lines at all hours of the day and night. BOCA also has its share of raccoons and possums. These critters are known to tear up roofs and gutters, gnaw away cornices, and tear out screens in crawl spaces of pier and beam homes, all in search of warm and dry nesting areas. In addition, in recent years, raccoons have attacked dogs and their owners walking on North Blvd.



Pest control companies report that a major source of attraction for all these creatures is cat food left outdoors. **Please feed pets inside.** If you must feed your them outside, pick up dishes as soon as pets are done with meals.

Rodents benefit the most from all of our good intentions. Birdseed, when placed on the ground, attracts rodents and possums, and squirrel feeders are enjoyed by all kinds of rodents. Bowls of kibble left out by well-meaning residents are consumed equally by roaches, rats and other critters. Squirrels, raccoons and possums often carry diseases fatal to humans and transmit them through their urine and feces. Evicting them can be costly and stressful.

Hungry cats are more likely to help keep the rodent population in check. Rather than feeding stray cats kibble, you can help them more by ensuring they are fixed and that they are healthy. SNAP is one nonprofit that offers low cost spay/neuter procedures and healthcare for feral animals.

As a reminder, feeding stray cats is a violation of City Ordinance. Please think twice before feeding the wildlife!

Please Don't Overstuff Recycling Bins

Some blocks are having problems with overstuffed recycling bins due to neighbors using other's bins. Please don't overstuff the bins. Doing so makes them difficult to pick up and creates messes that Solid Waste drivers leave behind for neighbors to pick up. If you need temporary additional recycling bin space, please ask your neighbor before using theirs. If you need a recycling bin, contact the City at 713-837-0311 to request one. If you don't have a bin yet, you can drop off recycling throughout the week at the Westpark Service Center at Fountainview.

City Trash Reminders

- Call 311 as soon as possible to report a missed collection. Get a service request number and forward it to DistrictC@houston.tx.gov for faster response.
- Place city trash containers and recycling bins at the curb at least 3 feet apart in compliance with city collection requirements.
- Place bags at curb no earlier than 6 pm the evening before collection.
- Contain leaves and yard clippings in city-approved biodegradable bags. Avoid sending leaves to the landfill altogether by composting them or have the yard crew take bags away or place them out of view.
- Avoid parking on the street on trash collection day. If you must park on the street be sure to leave enough space between your vehicle and trash container for crews to safely collect trash. Cars blocking bins may result in missed collection.
- The City is accepting glass in curbside recycling bins as of April 2019.
